The United States provides refuge to persons who have been persecuted or have a well-founded fear of persecution through two programs: a refugee program for persons outside the United States and an asylum program for persons in the United States and their immediate relatives. 





- Through derivative asylum status as the spouse or child of an asylee.


ASYLEE GRANTEES BY AGE¹

In 2015, **60%** of persons granted affirmative asylum were between the ages of 18 and 44. The median age of affirmative asylees was 26 years.
